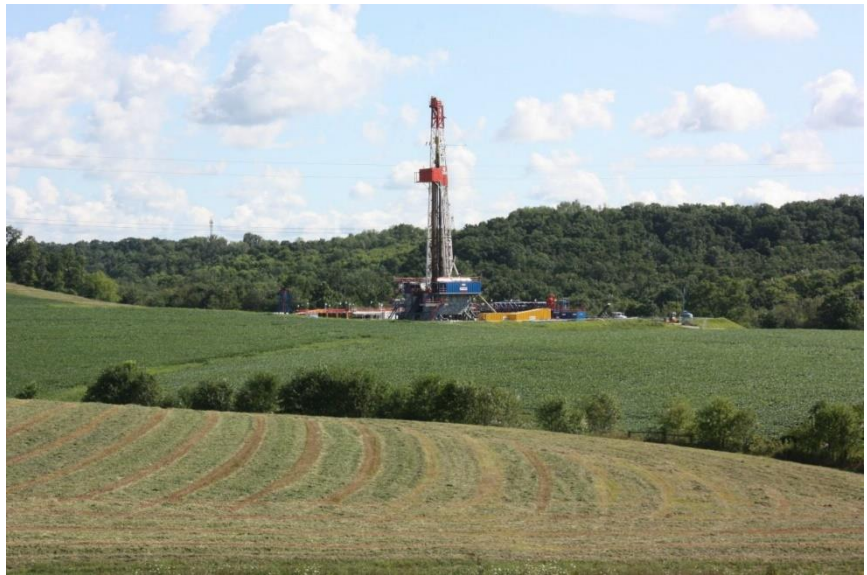

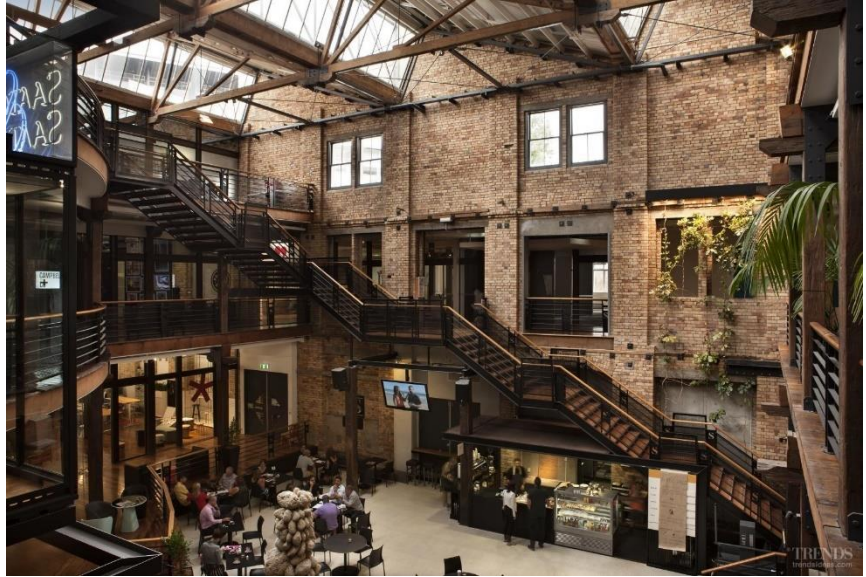

This grant focuses on three funding categories: 1) the renovation of vacant buildings; 2) the renovation or expansion of a building occupied by an existing North Carolina company wishing to expand in their current location; and 3) the renovation, expansion or construction of health care facilities that will lead to the direct creation of new, full-time jobs.

To be eligible for funding, the infrastructure is required to be on the building site or if not located on the site, directly related to the operation of the specific industrial activity.

Description:

North Carolina's Division of Environmental Assistance and

Customer Services directs a two-tiered urban planning grant program called the Abandoned Manufactured Homes Grant. This grant aims to assist communities with identifying, removing, and disposing abandoned manufactured homes. The amount of funding available is dependent on the county's tier designation. The first-tier of this grant focuses on the use of urban planning approaches to better address and identify issues associated with abandoned manufactured homes within a county's jurisdiction. Grant funds may be used for the development of an Abandoned Manufactured Homes Management Plan, aiding counties with identifying abandoned manufactured homes, and developing Abandoned Manufactured Home ordinances. The second-tier targets projects focusing on the removal of abandoned manufactured homes and recycling building materials.

NC Division of Water Infrastructure Asset and Inventory Assessment Grants

The Asset Inventory and

Assessment grants were created to encourage water and wastewater utilities to become more viable and more proactive in the management and financing of their systems. Eligible projects may include asset inventory, condition assessment of critical assets, and projects that address other components of critical assets. The grants are limited to \$150,000 from the Wastewater Reserve or the Drinking Water Reserve, over a period of three years, to the same local government unit or nonprofit water corporation. A match is required based on demographic factors such as how Local Government Unit indicators of percent population change, poverty rate, median household income (MHI), percent unemployment, and property valuation per capita compare with the state benchmarks.

Projects concentrating on community health invest resources in communities and neighborhoods to enhance the unique characteristics of all communities by encouraging neighborhood walkability in rural, urban, of suburban areas. The NC Stream Restoration sub-grant of the NC Division of Land and Water Stewardship Clean Water Management Trust Fund is a grant opportunity offering funding to support projects working to improve, enhance, and/or restore degraded water sources. Allocated funds may be used for stream restoration and/or stream enhancement.

For Stream Restoration projects there are two types of priorities. The first stream priority type focuses on retuning eroding streams in structure free lands to their natural states. The second stream restoration priority type focuses on stream bank erosion of urban area streams not only to improve water quality, but also enhance neighborhoods. Stream Enhancement projects focus on improving stream conditions by planting native vegetation along the stream bank to improve water quality and reduce erosion.

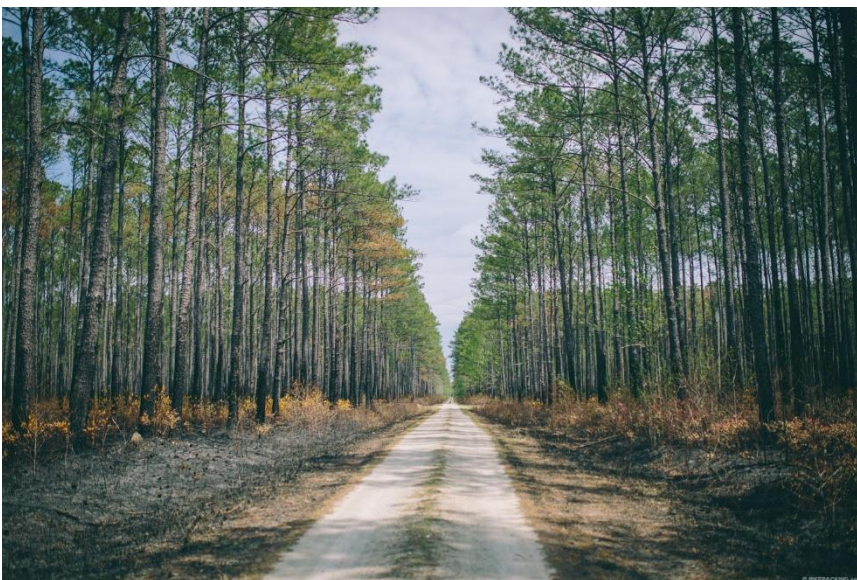

Carolina Department of Public Safety, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Mitigation Assistance Program provides funding for two types of community flood mitigation activities, Advanced Assistance and Technical Assistance, to communities in favorable standing with the National Flood Insurance Program. Proposed projects under Advance Assistance include, but are not limited to, projects intending to implement flood mitigation design and development of community flood mitigation projects. The goal of these projects is to reduce flood claims through the development of flood mitigation measures that address community flood risk. Technical assistance projects focus on the mitigation planning and mitigation projects reducing flood risk for severe repetitive loss (SRL) and repetitive loss (RL) properties. 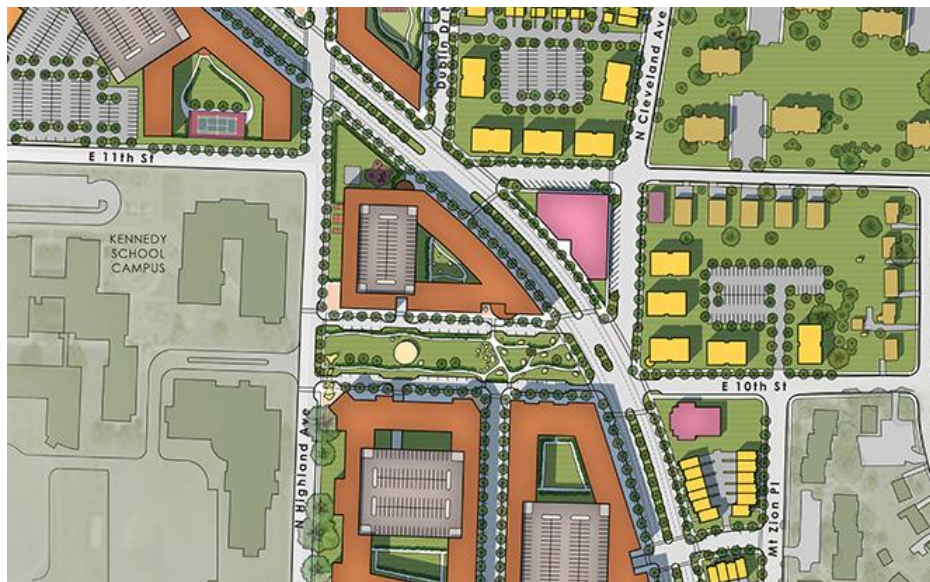
