DEADLINE EXTENDED – Disaster Resiliency Prioritization / Grant Writing Assistance – Please Complete ECC Disaster Resiliency Interest Survey by July 14th

ECC has some funding available to assist local governments in our region evaluate and prioritize their needs, as they relate to disaster resiliency. To confirm communities' interest in participating in the program, ECC is conducting a disaster resilience survey. The overall intent of the effort is to expand the capacity of local governments that are susceptible to natural disasters so they effectively can plan for, mitigate, respond to, and recover from declared disaster events, to restore community services back to pre-disaster conditions and make communities more resilient in dealing with future disasters.

Local governments interested in participating in this program are asked to complete a survey by July 14 th , and the survey is available at https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/eccdr.

PLEASE NOTE: Local governments in the ECC region that do not respond to this survey will still be included in any developed region-wide initiatives, but they may NOT be considered for more direct, individualized technical assistance.

DERPO Updates

SPOT 7.0 Update: The submittal window for new SPOT 7.0 projects will open on July 1. This will allow MPOs and RPOs to begin evaluating potential projects on SPOT Online, the NCDOT portal for SPOT project submission. Initial conversations on new DERPO submittals will take place at the July TCC and TAC meetings, county transportation committee meetings, and one-on-one with our local partners. The deadline for submittals is September 30, and it is DERPO's goal to have a final list of submittals ready for approval at the September TCC and TAC meetings, with final submittal taking place immediately afterwards.

Carteret County CTP Update: The next meeting concerning the Carteret County CTP will take place on Wednesday, July 19 at the Carteret County Transportation Committee in Morehead City. A Carteret County Transportation Survey that concluded on April 30 is being analyzed by our NCDOT partners.

RPO Funding Update: Beginning with the new fiscal year on July 1, all RPO grants will be increased 15%, which will increase the DERPO budget for FY 2024 troughly to \$160,000. In addition, local dues will no longer be a flat 20% local match, but they will correspond with the Tier status of member counties. If a RPO member county is a Tier 1 county, which is true in the case of DERPO, then local dues for all counties will be a local match

of 5%. The difference will be provided by state funds distributed quarterly.

Other Updates: Preliminary design work continues for projects throughout the region, such as roundabouts at the intersections of NC 58 and Mangrove Dr, and NC 58 and Coast Guard Rd in Emerald Isle, as well as continuing project design for the widening of Miller Blvd. in Havelock. Both the US 70/I-42 Commission and US 17-64 Association recently met, providing corridor updates to local and regional partners. The next quarterly meeting of the NC Association of RPOs will be held in Boone on July 27-28.



ECRPO Updates

Prioritization 7.0: Every 2 years the North Carolina Department of Transportation updates the State Transportation Improvement Plan (STIP). The STIP is a 10-year, fiscally constrained, planning document that outlines all future projects the Department will undertake. To create this plan, NCDOT solicits projects from Metropolitan Planning Organizations, Rural Planning Organizations (RPOs like ours), and each NCDOT Division and scores them against each other - to determine priority. The process for selecting these projects is called Prioritization. Starting July 1St, we will begin Prioritization 7.0.

The ECRPO has created a Prioritization Subcommittee to determine projects that the RPO will submit. We have been allotted 21 slots per mode to which projects may be submitted. This means that we have the potential to submit 21 highway, 21 bicycle and pedestrian, 21 aviation, 21 rail, and 21 public transit projects. The committee meets every other week on Friday mornings to discuss potential projects and review estimated scoring with RPO staff. ECRPO staff will be presenting the results of that committee to the TCC and TAC at our regularly scheduled meetings, and a final list of submitted projects is set to be approved at the September ECRPO TCC and TAC meeting. From there the projects will go on the ECRPO website for public review and will be submitted to NCDOT for scoring no later than September 30th.

Greene County CTP: A Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) is a long-range planning document created to outline the needs and goals for transportation in a given region. Unlike the STIP, CTPs do not have to be fiscally constrained and are not a guarantee that the projects listed in them are coming to fruition. These documents typically have a scope of 25 to 50 years and are updated every 10 years. The last Greene County CTP was completed in 2013.

The Greene County CTP Steering Committee is a group of local elected officials, county staff, DOT staff, and ECRPO staff who meet to guide and provide input on the CTP. While the Transportation Planning Division of NCDOT does most of the heavy work, the Steering Committee provides important local insight on the needs and goals of the community. The Committee first met in early June and was educated on its role, a timeline for the plan, and set a meeting schedule for the remainder of the CTP development cycle. The Committee will meet monthly, going forward.

RPO Funding Adjustments: In early June of 2023, RPOs across the state were informed that NCDOT was increasing RPO funding by 15% for each RPO statewide. In addition to this, local match percentages were adjusted, as well. Essentially, whatever county has the highest economic tier status in the RPO will set the local match percentage for the ENTIRE RPO. In the case of the ECRPO, currently all counties are Tier 1 status. This means that the total match from our 4 counties will total 5% of the allotted money from NCDOT, the State will match 15%, and the other 80% will be reimbursed federally, as it always has been. The 15% funding increase for the ECRPO brings our 'FY24 funding from \$132,969 to \$153,000.

ECC Joins the American Flood Coalition; Encourages Local Governments to Join

At its June 8th meeting, the ECC General Membership Board adopted a resolution to join the American Flood Coalition. There is no cost to join, and there are benefits to joining.

The American Flood Coalition (online at https://floodcoalition.org/) is a nonpartisan group of political, military, business, and local leaders that have come together to drive adaptation to the reality of higher seas, stronger storms, and more frequent flooding. The coalition seeks to advance solutions that support flood-affected communities and protect our nation's residents, economy, and military installations. Duplin County, the City of New Bern, the City of Jacksonville, the Town of Wallace, and the Town of North Topsail Beach are members of the American Flood Coalition.

Tony McEwen is the Carolinas Director at the American Flood Coalition. In his role, Tony seeks to advance policy solutions and strengthen AFC's presence at the state and local levels in North and South Carolina. Tony has nearly two decades of politics and advocacy experience at the local, state, and federal level in North Carolina. He previously served as Legislative and Intergovernmental Affairs Director for the City of Wilmington (NC), leading the city's state and federal advocacy efforts. Following Hurricane Florence, Tony initiated a large bipartisan coalition of leaders across Eastern North Carolina, which then partnered with AFC to advance flood resilience at the state and federal level. Prior to joining the City of Wilmington, he served in senior positions for multiple members of Congress.

Grant Opportunities



Southeast Crescent Regional Commission's (SCRC) State Economic and the Infrastructure Development (SEID) grant program, which

resulted from the Commission's 5-year Strategic Plan (2023-2028) is to revitalize/stimulate AL's, GA's, MS', NC's, SC's, and VA's public infrastructure improvements and economic development projects for telecommunications, transportation, high-quality health care,

access to affordable housing, business and workforce development, resource conservation and preservation, and tourism and recreation. Sixty-nine NC counties will be eligible for \$4,466,111; Carteret, Craven, Duplin, Greene, Jones, Lenoir, Onslow, Pamlico, and Wayne Counties are included in the funding notice. The goals are: 1) Invest

in Critical Infrastructure; 2) Improve Health and Support Services Access and Outcomes; 3) Strengthen Workforce Capacity; 4) Expand Affordable Housing Stock and Access; and 5) Promote Environmental, Conservation, Preservation, and Access. The deadline for pre-applications is July 21, 2023, the full application portal opens on Aug. 7, 2023, and the full application is due Sept. 15, 2023. Notification of SEID Awards will be announced on Nov. 14, 2023.

Local governments (village, town, city, and county) and non-profits (IRS designated 501 (c)(3) and 501 (a)) are eligible. \$20M-\$500M is the award ceiling. The federal cost share for projects: may not exceed 50% - in transitional counties or isolated areas of distress for projects in distressed counties, may not exceed 80% in distressed counties, and can be increased by 60-90% for multi-county or multi-state. The New Rural and Tribal Assistance Pilot Program makes \$10 million available over 5 years to provide states, local governments, and tribal governments with grants to support project development leading to future applications to DOT credit or grant programs. The grants can support legal, technical, and financial advisors to help them advance infrastructure projects. The 1st notice of funding opportunity will include 2 fiscal years and will make \$3.4 million available to eligible applicants on a 1st come, 1st served basis. Eligible project sponsors may receive grant funds to select advisors to assist with: Feasibility studies; project planning; revenue forecasting, funding, and financing options analyses; preliminary engineering and design work; environmental review; economic assessments and cost-benefit analyses; public benefits studies; technical, legal, and financial advisory assistance; and evaluation of potential projects to be delivered through alternative delivery methods.

Preparing for the Audit. As the fiscal year closed last week, it's a good time to focus on the upcoming annual audit. Most local governments spent at least some of their ARP/CSLFRF funds this fiscal year, which may trigger additional audit scrutiny. There are things you can do now to prepare for a successful audit. This blog post provides (hopefully helpful) guidance on preparing you (and your auditor) to audit ARP/CSLFRF funds.

ARPA Flex. "Any day now......" It seems like a running joke now that we are still waiting on ARPA Flex regulations that were due back in February, but we keep hearing "any day now." For those wondering what ARPA Flex is, Congress authorized some additional expenditure options for local governments who received over \$10 million in ARP/CSLFRF and must expend funds outside of the revenue replacement category. The new expenditure options relate to certain transportation projects, CDBG projects, and disaster recovery projects. But we need to wait for the US Treasury to issue regulations interpreting the flex provisions. Any day now....."
