GRANTS



NC Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ)'s Lead Service Line Replacement Funding is available for local governments, non-profit water companies, and investor-owned water utilities. Applications for these Lead Service Line Replacement funds are open year-round; the next awards will be made during State Water Infrastructure Authority meetings in Feb. and April 2024. In 2023 the NC Tobacco Trust Fund Commission (NCTTFC) helped farmers upgrade, diversify, and maintain 150 family farms in 46 counties, including Greene and Wayne Counties. NC State Extension awarded grants through NC AgVentures for family farms and community organizations. The Commission will give priority to projects based on size of geographic area, number of people impacted, and the impact on the agricultural community. The next round of funding will be available in early January 2024; at that time visit, <https://tobaccotrustfund.org/>.



NCDOT, State Planning and Research (SPR) Funds: NCDOT has issued a call for applications to the SPR Grant program. Funding for this program is given to NCDOT by USDOT for the development of the State Transportation Improvement Plan (STIP). NCDOT uses this money to fund MPOs and RPOs throughout the state. Without SPR, there are no RPOs. After funds for the MPOs and RPOs are allocated each fiscal year, NCDOT has money left over to fund additional projects. That funding may be obtained by applying for and being awarded an SPR Grant.

Projects funded in this program are NOT for construction. The grant provides funds for a wide variety of transportation plans and studies, including but not limited to:

- Fixed route transit studies,
- Corridor studies,
- Roadway plans,
- Intersection design studies,
- Bike/Ped plans,
- Economic studies related to transportation projects, and
- Traffic management studies.

Please reach out to your RPO director to discuss this program further if you are interested, but unsure if your plan qualifies for this funding. The SPR Grant program is a reimbursement-based program, and the ECC-

RPO is unable to encumber funds that might be necessary to process invoices during the reimbursement process; unfortunately, our fund balance is insufficient to sustain and supplement the transactions that could be expected while administering this program and directly impacts the RPO budget. In our region, grant recipients will provide 5% local match, the state reimburses 15% and the federal government reimburses 80%.

To apply, reach out to your RPO Senior Transportation Planner: Contact Becca Eversole, the Down East RPO at beversole@ecog.org, for these 4 counties -Carteret, Craven (outside New Bern MPO), Jones, and Pamlico, and contact Mickey Anderson, the Eastern Carolina RPO at mmanderson@ecog.org, for these 4 other counties - Duplin, Greene, Lenoir, and Wayne County (outside Goldsboro MPO). The plan or study is contracted out by the RPO to a qualified planning or engineering firm to work full time on the project. Depending on the project, a steering committee may collaborate with the firm, the RPO, and local officials - to guide the project. The application deadline is February 29th, 2024. If awarded, the funds will be made available on July 1st, 2024, and work may begin on the project.



Go Outside 'GO' Grants provide North Carolina students with opportunities for outdoor experiences -- to learn by doing. North Carolina educators are encouraged to apply for grant funding for outdoor field trips, visiting programs, and educational structures. NC DEQ's EPA Brownfields Assessment Grant to support "MARC Assessment grants" for Disadvantaged Communities: A "Brownfields site" is one that has been abandoned or is underused property because the potential or real threat of environmental contamination has obstructed its redevelopment. NC's Brownfields Program is administered by DEQ's Division of Waste Management, which works in tandem with property owners and developers to redevelop these sites.

Throughout the 5-year grant cycle, which closes out in Sept. 2027, DEQ Brownfields will work with partner communities and contractors to complete these tasks and encourage productive reuse within disadvantaged communities. DEQ Brownfields Grant Coordinator in the Redevelopment Section, Joselyn Harriger, indicated that 2 more years of BIL funding is available for those seeking Brownfields grants (competitive multipurpose grants for assessment or clean-up); they should plan now to be considered for the next cohort for 'FY 24. She suggested that municipalities ask property questions now – before the Brownfields NOFA is announced. Contact Joselyn at joselyn.harriger@deq.nc.gov or by phone at 980-297-4623. NC Department of Information Technology, Division of Broadband and Digital Equity has launched its 2nd round of the **Digital Champion Grant Program**; funding requests may be \$400,000 per county served to a maximum of \$1.5M. Eligible applicants include: Community service (local governments, town, city, and county), County libraries, K-12 Schools 501(c)(3), higher education, and Councils of Government. Projects must address at least 1 of the following digital inclusions: 1) Affordable, reliable high-speed internet; 2) Provision of internet enabled devices (computers, laptops, etc.) that meet users' needs; 3) Provide access to digital literacy and skills training; 4) Provide quality technical support; and 5) Creation of applications and online content designed to enable and encourage sufficiency, participation, and collaboration. Expanding broadband infrastructure will not be considered.
